

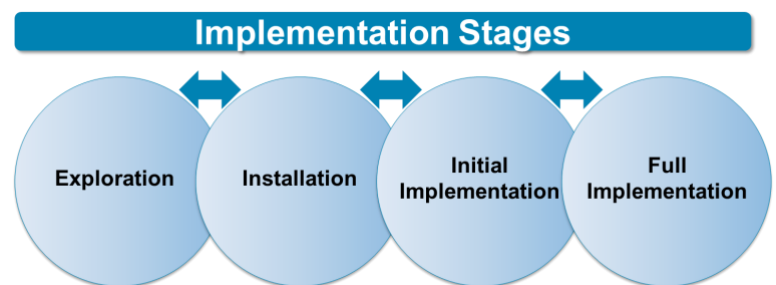
# Handout 13

## Implementation Stages

Implementation Stages outline the integrated, non-linear process of deciding to use an effective intervention and finally having it fully in place to realize the promised outcomes. Active implementation stages are Exploration, Installation, Initial Implementation and Full Implementation.

## Key Takeaways

1. The 4 Implementation Stages are Exploration, Installation, Initial Implementation, and Full Implementation and each have functions specific to the Stage.
2. The Rationale for Stage-Based Implementation: Starting with an awareness that implementation occurs in stages allows for intentional planning for the change process.
3. When we pay attention to Implementation Stages we can:
  - a. Match our activities to that stage and increase the likelihood of moving successfully through the stage and on to the next stage
  - b. Prepare for the activities and challenges that we will face in the next stage
  - c. Increase the likelihood of sustained implementation of educational practices
